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Preface

This book is designed for you, the consumer. Whether knowledgeable about chemicals or not, everyone will find it an informative source of data. It is different in that it is a book about chemicals, but it is not a chemistry book in the traditional sense. This book has a different purpose: that is, to answer your questions and provide information about all the chemicals you come in contact with every day.

In the past we have done research for chemical reference books for professionals in the environmental and occupational health field. In the course of doing research for books about workers' occupational exposure to chemicals, we became curious about how many of these chemicals we consumers contact in our lives and homes as ingredients in foods, cosmetics, and cleaning products.

Many people have suggested that we use the actual brand names of products and list the hazards of the specific chemicals they contain. This would not be possible for several reasons. Many manufacturers consider their ingredients list to be proprietary information. That means they do not divulge the formulations. Another reason this would not be feasible is that manufacturers frequently change the formulations of products to save money, increase effectiveness, or improve the product in some way.

Through the years, toxicologists, those who study chemicals and their effects, have come to some agreement on doses and their results. The following table is based on consumption by a 150-lb person.

After the publication of the first edition of 1001 Chemicals in Everyday Products, we did a series of interviews on radio and television shows across the United States. Many of the shows had call-in sessions after the interview during which the listeners and viewers could ask questions. The first part of this book is based on those questions and answers and is the source, or inspiration, for much of the material in this second edition. Many of the frequently asked questions (FAQ) are answered in this book. As a result, we want to thank readers and radio and television listeners and viewers for the idea of using this material for the new section.

The second part of the book is an alphabetical listing of chemicals that compose everyday products. Most of the chemical entries include a listing of synonyms. Some of the synonyms include a CAS number. The CAS (Chemical Abstracts Service) identification number is being used more frequently on consumer products because it is the surest means of identification when using reference sources.

Readers frequently ask which is the greater danger: the risk of cancer from preservatives or the risk of sickness from bacteria that might be present in the food if preservatives are not used? There is no simple answer. Consumers must educate themselves and make decisions about the risks. We hope this book will help people make those choices.

Consumers' Chemical Questions

Food Additives

1. What are chemicals used for in food?

Many times they are used to replace flavorings, colorings, and vitamins lost in processing.

2. Why do so many chemicals have long complicated names?

The names are descriptions, or roadmaps, of the molecular formula.

3. How is it that a chemical, such as hydrochloric acid, can be used in so many diverse ways? For instance, it is used for hair bleaching, swimming pool chemicals, and in food processing.

It depends on the concentration of the chemical. For instance, in food processing it is used in minute quantities to adjust the pH, the acidity, or alkalinity, of the product.

4. Why is it some food packaging does not list what is inside?

There are some 300 standard foods (catsup, ice cream, and peanut butter, for example) that do not require listing of ingredients unless nonstandard colors or chemicals are added.

5. If chemical additives are so dangerous, why are they permitted in food?

They are not dangerous for everyone. They do keep our food safer and cleaner. Because of allergies, sensitivities, and intolerances, some people must avoid them.

6. How many food, cosmetic, and cleaning products are in the supermarket?

Twenty years ago there were 8000; now there are estimated to be 24,000 different products.

7. What are indirect food additives?

These are chemicals, usually preservatives, that are put into food packaging so they can migrate to the food.

8. What is the advantage to the manufacturer of putting preservatives in the food via packaging?

The advantage is that the product has a longer shelf life and looks better (more attractive) to the consumer.

9. What is the quantity of food additives we consume each year?

It is estimated that we eat a total of 115 pounds of additives a year. This would include sugar and salt.

10. I have heard that fruits and vegetables are fumigated in trucks and rail cars to kill insects and bacteria. Is there some alternative to this?

One possibility would be food irradiation. It is used in 30 European countries and approved by the FDA and World Health Organization as safe.

11. Would the food that will be hit with gamma rays to kill insects and bacteria be radioactive?

No, it will not. The vitamins A, B, C, and E may be destroyed in the process though.

12. Will irradiated food have labels that indicate it has been irradiated?

Tomatoes, onions, strawberries, and mushrooms will need that irradiation label. In the past, spices, wheat, pork, and potatoes have not been identified as irradiated.

13. While in England, I saw they used cyclamates. Why don't we use them in the U.S.?

Cyclamates are being studied here and may be approved in the future. We use saccharin in limited amounts but England does not.

14. What is another chemical that is used in the U.S. but not in England?

Another example would be potassium bromate (a dough conditioner in bread, among other uses) which is not approved in England.

15. How many people are poisoned each year?

There were nearly two million cases reported to poison control centers last year. Most were accidental poisonings of children under five.

16. What was the major cause of poisonings of children under the age of five?

In most cases the children consumed too many vitamin or mineral pills. Iron pills look like candies and are very toxic in excessive amounts.

17. What are the symptoms of food allergy?

The most common is skin rash or hives. Other symptoms can include cramps, diarrhea, nausea, vomiting, sneezing, hay fever symptoms, and the most dangerous: anaphylactic shock.

18. Which foods are the most allergenic?

The most frequent offenders are peanuts, other nuts, soybeans, fish, shellfish, milk, and wheat.

19. Whenever I start at a new doctor's office they inquire about food allergies. Is this really necessary for them to know?

It is important for the doctor and staff to know about your allergies. For instance, recently it was determined that people who are allergic to fruits such as avocados, bananas, kiwi, papaya, or peaches are frequently the same patients who are allergic to latex. Of course latex is commonly used in medical offices.

20. How could fruit allergy trigger the same things that trigger latex allergy?

Latex is a natural product produced from the sap of the rubber tree in Brazil. It is thought that proteins in the sap are similar to those in the fruits.

21. What harmful effects could occur from a bad allergy attack?

The most serious allergy effect would be death from anaphylactic shock. Of course some people start with rashes and could have asthma attacks also.

22. Someone said that flounder, sole, and halibut are healthier to eat than tuna fish. Why is this so?

They could be referring to the fact that detectable levels of mercury were

found in tuna fish, but not in the others mentioned, which are deep-water fish.

23. What are intermediate chemicals?

These are used in the processing of food. For instance, there are defoamers used in fruit juice. There are solvents used to remove caffeine from coffee, and antibacterials used to prevent bacterial growth in sugar.

24. What is PKU?

The letters stand for phenylketonuria. People with this condition cannot metabolize phenylalanine and must avoid the nonnutritive sweetener aspartame (Nutrasweet).

25. Can someone just have a simple allergy to aspartame?

Absolutely. Allergists say that everyone is allergic to something at one time or another.

26. In what foods are sulfites used? What is their purpose?

Some examples would be in wine and salad bars. They prevent bacterial growth and also prevent browning of fresh greens.

27. Can sulfites harm me?

There are people, particularly asthmatics, who must avoid sulfites. Most food or drink containing sulfites must be labeled. There have been instances where people who were asthmatics went into anaphylactic shock and died from consuming sulfites.

28. If I rinse off my fruits and vegetables, won't that get rid of the pesticide residue?

Not necessarily. Some fruits and vegetables (apples, cucumbers, peppers) are coated with wax and the pesticides, fertilizers, and fungicides are sealed in the wax.

29. I thought that the most dangerous pesticides to humans were banned by the U.S. Government for use in the U.S.?

That is true, but chemical companies are still manufacturing them and selling them to South and Central American countries. This produce then comes back to us in the winter, when 40% of the produce comes from foreign countries that do not have the restrictions we do.

30. Is there any other way pesticides can get into food?

Yes, they can be in the fruits and vegetables because they are absorbed by plant roots and plant surfaces. This is called systemic absorption.

31. What are some of the waxes used on fruits and vegetables?

They are beeswax, carnauba, candelilla, paraffin, and shellac, to name a few.

32. Aren't some chemical preservatives being replaced by natural products?

An example would be potatoes. They have always been dusted with chemicals to prevent sprouting and rotting during storage. Recently, many producers started to use a product made from jasmine flowers. This is a safe, natural product, which is pleasantly aromatic.

33. Is Kombucha tea hazardous to my health?

The CDC said that drinking four ounces daily might be safe for healthy persons. However, those with health problems or those who drink excessive amounts may risk illness. It is prepared by fermenting yeasts and bacteria together for two weeks with black tea and sugar. This mixture is called a "mushroom." Deaths associated with its consumption have been from a metabolic disorder characterized by elevated levels of lactic acid.

34. What is the GRAS list?

It is a list of certain items developed in 1958. The letters stand for Generally Recognized As Safe. It is not a guarantee of absolute safety because some of the additives were later tested and removed from the list.

35. What are some examples of items on the GRAS list?

Ordinary spices, salt, sugar, and phosphoric acid, (which gives soda pop its zip) are a few.

36. I read that toxicologists analyzed some mother's breast milk and found PCBs. What are these?

PCB stands for polychlorinated biphenyl. This is found in electrical transformers and components. It is used for insulating and as a heat exchange fluid and hydraulic fluid. It is on the EPA Extremely Hazardous Substances List. It is a confirmed cancer-causing chemical that is toxic and can cause severe liver damage. It has also been linked to behavioral problems in children.

37. Is MSG (monosodium glutamate) harmful to me if I eat food with it?

Some people have no ill effects whatsoever. Others have a variety of reactions including headaches, hallucinations, dyspnea (shortness of breath), nausea, vomiting, dermatitis, mood changes, and even IBS (irritable bowel syndrome). Some believe it does not have an allergic effect but rather a pharmacologic effect. That means that everyone would develop symptoms if enough of it were consumed. It could be compared to alcohol; that is, we all have different tolerances.

38. Is MSG in any other foods besides Chinese foods?

Yes, It is used in meats, poultry, sauces, soups, pickles, condiments, bakery products, and even candies.

39. How will we know which tomatoes, and other foods, are gene altered?

These foods will be labeled when they come to market.

40. What improvement is there in a gene-altered vegetable?

A tomato would look better and have a longer shelf life.

41. I have read about BST and BGH, the hormones that are given to cows. Would the hormones and antibiotics that are given to cows and other cattle get into our body when we drink the milk and eat the meat?

This is a major concern right now that is still being studied. There are conflicting scientific studies on the issue.

42. What difference does it make if we get the antibiotics in our food via cattle?

The problem is that we may become antibiotic resistant and then antibiotic medication will have little or no effect on the infections we get.

43. Will pesticides harm a person if they are not swallowed but simply get on the skin?

Most of the pesticides used in the U.S. are contact poisons. That means they are absorbed through the skin. That is why children and pets should not be on a recently pesticide-treated lawn.

44. Don't these chemicals just pass through our bodies?

Some of the harmful chemicals do not. For instance, pesticides are stored in

fat cells. In fact, the same is true in animals. If you eat meat, cut off the fat. Also lead is stored in the bones and can cause mental retardation, kidney and liver damage, retard growth, and have other harmful effects. Inhaled asbestos can cause cancer years later. These are just a few examples.

45. I heard that our Florida strawberries are rejected in Canada because of the fungicides on them. Why are they distributed here?

The fungicide you are referring to is called Captan® and the Canadian government rejects fruits with more than five parts per million. Our government permits up to 25 parts per million. The fact is that Captan® is permitted at this level because it is economically beneficial to the farmers.

46. If we are very careful and remove the skins of the vegetables then are we safe from consuming chemicals like pesticides, bactericides, fungicides, herbicides, and so on?

No, because some chemicals are put on the plants and absorbed into the plant by the leaves and roots and get into the fruit and vegetables this way.

47. What is the chemical that is put on plants that is similar to Lysol disinfectant?

That is called orthophenylphenol. It is a fungicide and the active ingredient in Lysol disinfectant.

48. Are some chemicals put on foods to make them last longer in the stores?

Yes, a common one is a herbicide sprayed on potatoes to keep them from sprouting. One popular preemergent is chlorprophame.

49. What are some of the problems associated with lead consumption by children?

Four million children consume lead each year by eating paint chips, chewing crayons manufactured in China, drinking or eating from foreign pottery, or drinking water from pipes with lead solder, to name a few sources. These children suffer hearing losses, learning disabilities, and lower IQs.

50. What is the chemical component in antacids and laxatives that we all can buy over-the-counter?

That is magnesium. It is generally safe for self-medication although poisoning is more common than once thought because it is frequently undetected by doctors and misdiagnosed.

51. What are the symptoms of magnesium poisoning?

The symptoms include irregular heartbeat, confusion, muscle weakness, nausea or vomiting, and possibly coma. This is diagnosed by routine blood tests that check the level of magnesium.

52. Who are at risk for magnesium poisoning?

The elderly and people with a history of GI tract disease who take multiple medications are the most at risk. Those who only take antacids and laxatives occasionally would not have any problem. Those who take them regularly should be sure their physician is aware of this.

53. Why did the pharmacist tell me not to take my antibiotic with orange juice?

Orange juice and the acids in fruit juices may decrease the effect of certain antibiotics such as penicillin and erythromycin. For this reason, pharmacists recommend drinking water instead.

54. Would it be a good idea to take antibiotics with a drink of milk?

If the antibiotic is tetracycline, milk and dairy products can reduce its effectiveness. For that reason, it is best to take tetracycline an hour before or two hours after milk or dairy products.

55. What does "caffeinism" mean?

"Caffeinism" refers to the increase of symptoms such as nervousness, agitation, headaches, insomnia, and irritability in a person taking birth control pills.

56. What is the chemical in honey that can help my memory?

Acetycholine is a brain chemical that allows brain cells to communicate better and improves memory. Studies at UVA have shown that honey contains a form of glucose that causes the release of this chemical. It was shown to improve memory for an hour in both students and Alzheimer's patients.

57. Why is it taking so long for more irradiated foods to appear on the supermarket shelves?

The chief reason is that companies are worried about the consumer's perception of irradiated foods. There have been many false reports about harmful effects.

58. What is meant by the term "designer foods"?

This term refers to hypernutritious foods or nutraceuticals. When it was de-

termined that phytochemicals played a role in cancer prevention, many studies were conducted to determine which substances were most effective. The food industry supports nutrition research in cancer prevention and the possibility of supplementing foods with phytochemicals.

59. What are the phytochemicals?

These are chemicals that are contained in all plant foods. In fact, the word "phyto" means "plant" in Greek. Interestingly, they are not vitamins or minerals. Phytochemicals are not nutritious in the usual sense. Some types are isothiocyanates, polyphenols, flavonoids, monterpenes, and organosulfides. They are credited with the treatment and prevention of the four major causes of death: heart disease, cancer, high blood pressure, and diabetes.

60. What are the beneficial chemicals found in cruciferous vegetables?

They are isothiocyanates. These vegetables include broccoli, cabbage, and brussel sprouts. They have been shown to be chemoprotective against cancer of the breast, liver, esophagus, lung, intestine, and bladder.

61. Is it true that tea can be a cancer preventative?

Many epidemiological studies have shown that green and black tea phenolics inhibit esophageal cancer. It is thought that tea can be beneficial in other ways as well. Studies are currently being conducted.

62. What are the beneficial chemicals in citrus peels and cherries?

They are monoterpenes. They seem to act as cancer inhibitors in the colon, breast, liver, and pancreas.

63. If I buy fruit and produce and prepare it in the food processor for my baby, isn't this a lot healthier for my baby than jarred baby foods?

Not necessarily. The food you start with from the grocery may be older due to shipping and exposure to light and heat than the produce the manufacturer gets from the field and immediately processes.

64. What do they add to the meat in fat-free hot dogs to keep them juicy?

They add water, gums, and colloids (starch-type products) to increase tenderness and retain moisture.

65. What is it about foods that contain fat that make them taste better than nonfat foods?

It is hard to believe, but fat molecules are round, and this is the sensation

that our taste buds find so appealing. Protein molecules are elongated. We enjoy the smooth feeling in our mouths, according to food scientists.

66. Scientists say that women planning on having children and adults who are at high risk of heart attack, should take folic acid supplements. What are the recommended doses, and which foods are highest in folic acid?

The CDC suggests 400 mcg daily for those two groups of people. The highest mcg is found in lentils at 179 mcg per half cup and fortified breakfast cereals, which have 146 to 177 mcg per half cup. Spinach has 131 mcg per half cup, orange juice 109 mcg per cup, artichokes 95 mcg per cup. Green peas, broccoli, corn, and so on are all beneficial. Usually, natural sources are recommended. However, folic acid studies show that supplements are better because they are more easily absorbed the food-based folate acid.

67. What causes intestinal gas?

The major cause of intestinal gas is undigested carbohydrates. In particular, the oligosaccharides, which are the most common of the carbohydrates. These are mostly found in beans and other legumes. The second most common is lactose or milk sugar. The problem exists because so many people are lactose intolerant. This means they lack the enzyme that breaks down lactose.

68. What is the red pigment in tomatoes?

It is lycopene, which is a powerful antioxidant. Harvard and U.K. researchers' studies indicate that lycopene is thought to block cell damage leading to certain cancers. The studies are particularly favorable regarding prostate cancer. Therefore, cooked or fresh tomatoes may be as important in preventing cancers as carrots and green vegetables. The tomatoes contain significant amounts of beta carotene which is also considered to be an excellent antioxidant.

69. What are some of the other chemicals in tomatoes?

Tomatoes also contain phenolic acids and plant sterols. These are also considered to be protectors against cancer. They also contain monoterpenes. These are antioxidants that protect against cancer and prevent cholesterol production.

70. Is there any way to avoid the danger of salmonella when eating raw eggs or foods that contain raw eggs like Caesar salad?

Food scientists at Purdue University have figured out a way to pasteurize

eggs in their shells. Currently, the only safe ones would be the liquid ones that have been removed from their shells and pasteurized.

71. Are there any natural food preservatives or are they always in the form of added chemicals?

There are naturally occurring food preservatives. One has recently been identified. It is a substance in cinnamon named benzaldehyde. It is also found in black pepper, vanilla, and peaches. We may be seeing it in the future as a preservative in canned foods that now require heating for lengthy times before they are safe.

72. What is chromium?

It is a trace mineral that is considered important in helping cells break down sugar into energy for the body.

73. I have read some wonderful reports about people taking chromium supplements. They said overweight people lose weight, gain muscle mass, live longer, and improve well being. Have these results been proved?

No, they have not. The scientific studies have produced mixed results. Toxicologists believe the metal may accumulate in tissues. Scientists suggest that a lower supplement, such as a 50-mcg dose, may be more appropriate than massive doses. This is sold as a supplement and does not require FDA approval.

74. What foods are high sources of chromium?

Cereals are good, especially bran cereals, as well as canned tomatoes and canned pineapple, broccoli, black pepper, tea, cocoa, corn chips, and white potatoes.

75. There is a new medicine for osteoporosis. Does this mean I can stop taking calcium if I take the new medication?

The chemical name is alendronate sodium. The prescription drug name is Fosamax®. Studies showed that it could actually restore bone mass. It normalizes the bone-building cycle, but you still need to take calcium to mineralize the bone.

76. Is the new medication better than the nose spray medication for osteoporosis?

Yes, so far it appears that it is an improvement over the other two treatments, calcitonin nasal spray and fluoride.

77. What are the hormone supplements that are so popular these days?

You are probably referring to chemicals such as melatonin and DHEA.

78. What is tryptophan?

It is an essential amino acid found in milk and dairy products. There have been claims that, since it increases the neurotransmitter serotonin, it is a relaxant and induces calmness. Studies have shown that oral ingestion or injection of tryptophan raises brain tryptophan and serotonin levels. However, foods rich in tryptophan, such as dairy products, do not increase brain levels or stimulate serotonin synthesis.

79. Is melatonin used in Europe?

Melatonin is banned in France and Britain. Other countries consider it a drug and it is only available via prescription. Countries such as Italy and Denmark have prohibited manufacturers from making claims as to its benefits until proved. In Europe these supplements are considered black market products. However, many Europeans acquire them from American friends. Even though they can be found in health food stores in the U.S., they are under-the-counter products in Canadian stores.

80. What does DHEA stand for?

It stands for dehydroepiandrosterone, which is called the mother hormone. It has been a "hot" supplement for the last couple of years.

81. What is DHEA?

DHEA is dehydroepiandrosterone. It is a plant derivative of a hormone from the Mexican wild yam. It is naturally produced by the adrenals and is one of the most abundant hormones in humans. It begins at age 7 and peaks around 30 years of age. As a supplement, it promises to enhance metabolic functions, increase energy, control stress, maintain proper mineral levels, balance the production of hormones, fight aging, improve memory, build body muscle, and reduce fat. It supposedly reduces the risk of cancer, heart disease, atherosclerosis, Alzheimer's disease, and schizophrenia. Many scientists claim this supplement is useless.

82. What are the chemical components of chocolate?

There are many components in chocolate. The biologically active stimulants are caffeine and theobromine. The amine compounds are tyramine and phenylethylamine or PEA.

83. What is the effect on the body of the amine compounds found in chocolate?

Amine compounds act as stimulants and could elevate blood pressure. They could also cause migraine headaches.

84. How does phenylethylamine work in our body?

It dilates our brain's blood vessels and triggers headaches. Red wines and cheese are also in this category and cause the same effects.

85. Can the chemicals in chocolate cause any other problems?

People who are at risk for kidney stones should not eat too much chocolate because it can increase urinary oxalate excretion.

86. I have heard that garlic contains many useful chemicals. What are they?

Garlic is a very special vegetable. It contains vitamins A, B, and C. It also has calcium, potassium, and iron. It contains antioxidants, carotenes, germanium, and selenium. Most important is the amino acid allicin. Garlic contains chemicals that act like ACE, that is, angiotensin converting enzyme inhibitors. These are the prescriptions usually given to lower blood pressure and protect the heart. It is thought that garlic works by dilating blood vessels.

87. How do these chemicals in garlic help our bodies?

These ingredients have been credited with having antibiotic effects, helping asthma patients, and combatting acne problems, ear infections, gallbladder disorders, and diarrhea. They also are said to cause reductions in HDL and even be inhibitors of fibrogen that causes platelet clumping that leads to stroke and hardening of the arteries. Garlic was used by the British during World Wars I and II to prevent gangrene and treat infections.

88. Is it true that chemicals in dark beer make it healthier for a person to drink than light beer?

Dark beers are very high in flavinoids. These contain some vitamin-like compounds that researchers claim make platelets less likely to clot.

89. What is the story on Olestra®?

Olestra® is a fat replacer food additive. It is a sucrose polyester that can be used in place of fat without adding calories. As a result of its chemical composition, it is not digested by the body and passes through without adding fat or calories to food. That means that it is not digestible.

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90. Is Olestra® approved by the FDA?

Yes, it has been approved, but it requires a caveat also. An Olestra® product must include the following statement on the label: "This product contains olestra. Olestra® may cause abdominal cramping and loose stools. Olestra® also inhibits the absorption of some vitamins and other nutrients. Vitamins A, D, E, and K have been added." FDA only approves its use in snack food.

91. What is meant by functional foods?

This term refers to foods that contain physiologically active components that promote health and may prevent disease. Most foods are functional because they contain chemical nutrients that are essential for health. Currently there is a great deal of research on the phytochemical components of foods such as beta carotene and other cartenoids that are responsible for good health.

92. Is it true that a poison such as sulfur dioxide is used on grapes?

You are confusing the colorless gas sulfur dioxide with the chemical that is used on foods as a bleaching agent or preservative. It is mildly toxic to humans when inhaled as a gas, but after being used on grapes to prevent darkening, it dissipates and is harmless to the consumer. This is why we have golden raisins; when sulfur dioxide is used, grapes do not darken as regular raisins do. They are also dried with artificial heat to prevent darkening.

93. Isn't produce sometimes exposed to ethylene gas for a purpose?

Yes, many times tomatoes are picked green and ripened with ethylene gas. These are the flavorless ones as opposed to vine-ripened tomatoes.

94. Is it the alcohol or other chemicals in wines that seem to prove beneficial to the heart in moderate amounts?

Some chemists are saying that the phenolics, natural antioxidants, in nonalcoholic wine prevent cholesterol molecules from forming and clogging the arteries. Phenolics are also found in fresh fruits and vegetables such as raisins, grapes, and onions. At the same time, other scientists say benefits are derived by beer drinkers; therefore, it must be alcohol that provides the benefits.

95. I am pregnant and a heavy coffee drinker. I recently heard that another bad effect was attributed to caffeine. What is that about?

Recent studies indicate that pregnant women who drink three or more cups of coffee or tea a day during the first trimester of pregnancy have twice as many miscarriages as those who drink less.

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96. How much caffeine do the popular beverages contain?

Here are some figures on that subject from the FDA and National Soft Drink Association. A 5-oz cup of coffee averages 115 mg of caffeine, a 5-oz cup of tea 40 mg, a 6-oz soft drink 18 mg, a cup of cocoa 4 mg, and one ounce of chocolate syrup 4 mg.

97. I heard that tea contains a lot of chemicals. What are these?

More cultures of the world drink tea than any other beverage. The tea that is most popular and with which we are most familiar is obtained from the leaves of an evergreen tree. Other teas are produced from herbs, flowers, and roots. Some people have allergies to these teas. For instance, chamomile is a plant cousin of ragweed and could produce an allergic reaction. Tea leaves contain fluoride, which is beneficial to our teeth. Polyphenols, chemicals considered to be anticancer and heart disease, are also abundant. The ingredient tannin can be irritating and can cut down the absorption of iron although moderate amounts are probably harmless. The flavonoids in tea are thought to prevent strokes.

98. Why is salt iodized?

We use iodized salt to prevent goiters and mental retardation. In China, a country of 1.2 billion people, there are 10 million cases of retardation from lack of iodine. Although just trace amounts would prevent this, many people buy noniodized salt on the black market to save money. Maternal iodine deficiency results in growth and brain impairment in the child.

99. I know that sodium is a chemical element. What does it mean when a label says the food has low sodium?

This term refers to food that has no more than 140 milligrams of sodium per serving. Therefore, it is more desirable for someone who is advised to be on a low sodium diet.

100. When we see "salt free" on the label, is this the same as low sodium?

If it says "salt free," the food contains fewer than five milligrams of sodium per serving.

101. What does it mean if a label states that the food or drink is sugar or sucrose free?

This is defined as less than half a gram of sugar per serving.

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102. Can we be sure that a food that says it is calorie free has absolutely no calories in it?

No, by definition, "calorie free" refers to a food with no more than five calories per serving.

103. Since low-fat diets are so popular, what does it mean when the label says "fat free"?

"Fat free" on a label means less than half a gram of fat per serving, assuming the food has no added fat or oil ingredients.

104. Labels sometime state that the product is low fat. How much fat is really in it?

This would mean that it contains no more than three grams of fat per serving.

105. Another common term that is often seen on labels is the word "light." What about these foods?

They contain at least one-third fewer calories, or half the amount of fat, in the usual or typical version of the food.

106. How can the "questionable" chemicals be sold right over the counter in health food stores?

There is a law that states that if a product is labeled as a "food supplement" the product can bypass some restrictions required for drugs and chemicals.

107. Why is BHA added to meats, cereals, chewing gum, desserts, shortening, dry fruit, margarine, pizza toppings, potato products, poultry, rice, and sausage?

It is added to foods to act as a preservative and antioxidant, to slow down spoiling, and to extend their shelf life. Unfortunately, it has caused cancers, tumors, and birth defects in animal studies. Its use is limited by FDA regulations.

108. What are the major components of foods?

Water is the major component. In fact, 99% of foods are composed of water, proteins, carbohydrates, fiber, fat, and ash.

109. What are the minor components of foods?

Vitamins and minerals are the minor or microcomponents.

110. Should we be concerned about the bacteria in food?

Food plant sanitation has greatly improved over the years. Some germs are

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controlled in foods by heat processing, freezing, dehydration, chilling, and ionizing radiation. Remember that not all bacteria are dangerous. Bacteria are used to ferment foods. That is how some pickles, sausages, alcoholic drinks, and yogurt are prepared.

111. Which food has the greatest water content, celery, tomatoes, or milk?

Surprisingly, celery has over 94% water content, tomatoes have over 93%, and milk has just 87%. The water in the vegetables is held in the cell walls.

112. Why is the FDA requiring manufacturers to fortify products with folic acid?

This is to prevent spinal cord birth defects. Women of child-bearing age should consume 400 micrograms a day. It is also beneficial to others to cut the risk of heart disease and cervical cancer. Since supplemented foods will still not supply enough, it is recommended that individuals also consume orange juice, dried beans, and wheat germ.

113. What is DHA or omega-3 oil?

This is docosahexaenoic acid, a brain protective fatty acid derived from fish. It also is the same oil that has been credited with fighting heart disease. Some of the beneficial results are reducing depression and aggression, and as a stimulant to brain development.

114. In what foods can I find vitamin B6 and folic acid?

Vitamin B6 is found in whole grains, beans, legumes, fish, pork, and chicken. Leafy vegetables, orange juice, legumes, and fortified cereals are the best sources for folic acid.

115. What is this new product in the health food stores called pregnenolone?

This is promoted as nature's feel good hormone. It is a hormone made from cholesterol. It is formed in the body organs that produce steroid hormones, such as the liver, adrenals, skin, ovaries, and testicles. It is thought that the brain has the capacity to use cholesterol to make pregnenolone and other steroid hormones. Some believe this chemical has a positive effect on energy, memory, stress reduction, and arthritis. It is thought to be beneficial as a hormone replacement for those in middle or old age.

116. What is the chemical that gives onions such a strong smell?

They contain substances called thiols that are characterized by strong odors. Of course onions are edible by humans, but dangerous to dogs and cats.

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117. What are the harmful chemicals that are formed from grilling meats?

PAHs or polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons are formed when fat drips down into an open flame that sends up smoke, coating the foods with carcinogens. HCAs are created when meat, fish, and poultry are cooked at high heat such as when well done, panfried, barbecued, or broiled. There is a chemical in muscle meats called creatine that produces the HCAs. The safest way to prepare such foods would be by microwaving, stewing, poaching, or boiling.

118. What is a nutraceutical?

This is the term given to foods that are rich in antioxidants and phytochemicals. These are foods that provide benefits beyond the traditional vitamin and mineral content.

119. What is the current thinking about calcium and kidney stones?

The newest studies indicate that calcium in milk may be beneficial. It is thought that calcium helps to neutralize the effect of oxalates, the chemicals that are thought to initiate the formation of kidney stones in some people. Oxalates are in fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and beans. When the foods that contain oxalates are consumed with milk, the calcium in the milk binds with the oxalates, and allows the food to go through the body without absorbing the oxalates. In this manner the risk of kidney stones is reduced.

120. What are the benefits of soy isoflavones?

Soy isoflavones are a group of phytochemicals only found in soybeans. The isoflavones genistein and daidzein have strong antioxidant benefits that reduce the risk of heart disease and cancer, as well as other diseases.

121. Do soybeans contain other beneficial chemicals?

Soybeans contain saponins that are a group of phytonutrients with immunity and disease-fighting potential. They also act to increase immunity, prevent cancer, and fight infections. Soy is also high in protein, vitamin E, lecithin, and omega-3 fatty acids.

122. What is the newly identified nutraceutical in cereals?

Tocotrienals are the new antioxidants found in the oil fractions of cereal grains. Examples would be wheat, rice, rye, and barley grains. The benefits of tocotrienals are similar to those of tocopherols and vitamin E. They can reduce cholesterol and slow the advance of atherosclerosis and the progress of certain cancers. These nutraceuticals are available as supplements.

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123. What are the flavonoids in wild blueberries?

They are anthocyanins. These flavonoids are the blue pigment material in the fruit. This is an antioxidant that has been credited with improving eyesight, slowing the effects of aging and memory loss, and improving circulation.

124. What is Pycnogenol®?

This is a supplement containing more than forty water-soluble antioxidants. It is a complex of antioxidant flavonoids obtained from the bark of French maritime pine trees. These flavonoids are credited with reducing stroke and heart disease and improving the immune system to effectively fight viruses.

Cosmetics

1. What does the FDA state that a cosmetic can claim?

A cosmetic can claim four things. It can cleanse, beautify, promote attractiveness, and alter the appearance in general.

2. What type of claims can be made for drugs?

A product that makes structural and functional claims can be classified as a drug. For instance, a product that penetrates the skin and causes cell rejuvenation has legitimate claims as a drug.

3. How are vitamins categorized, as drugs or cosmetics?

According to the Dietary Supplement Health and Education Act of 1994, this has not been defined. These are probably dietary supplements that the FDA no longer oversees.

4. When does a soap become a cosmetic?

If the manufacturer makes a cosmetic claim on the label, such as "moisturizing" or "deodorizing", the product must meet all FDA requirements for a cosmetic and the label must list all ingredients.

5. When does soap become a drug?

If the manufacturer makes a claim that the soap has antidandruff, antibacterial, antiperspirant, or antiacne action, the product is a drug, and the label must list all active ingredients as is required for all drug products.

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6. Are the ingredients in cosmetics and personal care products approved by the government?

There is an industry sponsored Cosmetic Ingredient Review (CIR) that tests the ingredients. Essentially, this is a self-regulated industry.

7. Are the manufacturers of cosmetics and personal care products required to list the ingredients?

Yes, hair sprays, creams, shaving lotions, and perfumes should list ingredients. On the other hand, this applies to items manufactured in this country. If they are imported, they might not have an ingredient label.

8. What ingredient in cosmetics causes the most dermatological problems?

A mascara preservative called quaternium 15 is one of the biggest offenders and cause of contact dermatitis. Of course, the eye area is the most delicate.

9. The ingredient, methylparaben, seems to be in many cosmetic products. What does it do?

It is a preservative that prevents mold growth. It is frequently a cause of allergic reactions.

10. Why is the list of ingredients so long on a simple bottle of shampoo?

The manufacturers want to add coloring, perfume, preservatives, sequestrants (holds it together), fillers, humectants (moisturizers), thickeners, texturizers, and stabilizers. These make the final product appealing to the consumer.

11. If the cosmetic says it is hypoallergenic is it completely safe to use?

That means there are no fragrance ingredients in the product, but someone could still be allergic to other ingredients.

12. Why can I not use hair dye on my eyelashes and eyebrows?

Coal tar dyes, which are legal for hair dyes, are restricted from use around the eyes. They have caused blindness.

13. Are alcohol-based mouthwashes safe to use?

One study indicated that high alcohol content products can increase a person's risk of oral cancer by as much as 60%. More recent studies have questioned this.

14. What is the harmful ingredient in nail polish?

It is toluene. It is mildly toxic by breathing and can cause hallucinations, CNS

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(central nervous system) effects, bone marrow changes, and birth defects, among other problems.

15. What other products contain toluene?

Toluene is also in paints, spot removers, rubber cement, gasoline, detergents, and perfumes, among others.

16. What is meant by aroma-free zones?

Some feel that the odor of cologne, perfume, and shaving lotions are offensive and dangerous to those with allergies. There is talk that there will be areas of restaurants and public places set aside for those who do not want to be exposed to strong aromas.

17. Is the aluminum chloride in deodorants harmful to us?

It is a possible allergen and irritant. It would be harmful if it were swallowed. There is still some suspicion that aluminum could be a factor in Alzheimer's disease, but it has not been confirmed.

18. What is the greatest problem from the use of cosmetics and toilet-ries?

Probably the absorption of solvents, coloring agents, and fragrances. It once was thought that the skin was a barrier that did not absorb chemicals. We now know more about cutaneous absorption. Of course, allergies are a problem, too.

19. Why is talcum powder dangerous?

It could be an allergen and skin irritant. If inhaled repeatedly, it could cause pulmonary fibrosis that may be due to asbestos in the powder. Also, a study of women who used talcum powder on their sanitary napkins indicated that they had an increased incidence of ovarian cancer.

20. What is being substituted for the chlorofluorcarbons (CFCs) as propellants in air fresheners, deodorants, hair sprays, and so forth?

Propane and butane are two commonly used propellants. These are also harmful because when inhaled they depress the central nervous system and may lead to cardiac or pulmonary arrest. Permanent nerve and brain damage could occur.

21. For what is formaldehyde used?

It is a deodorizer, solvent, disinfectant, and adhesive that is in glues, air

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fresheners, antiperspirants, dry-cleaning solvents, hair spray, after-shave lotions, permanent press fabrics, particle board, and plywood.

22. Is formaldehyde harmful?

Yes, it is thought to be a cause of sick building syndrome. The air inside buildings and mobile homes can be dangerous because of the outgassing of chemicals such as formaldehyde from the paneling, carpeting, and wallboard. Longterm exposure affects the central nervous system. It could cause aggression or drowsiness. It can cause skin and eye irritation. It is a confirmed cancer-causing chemical. If swallowed, it is a poison that causes violent vomiting and diarrhea.

23. What are some harmful effects to cosmetologists from using products containing formaldehyde?

A recent study indicates that they have twice as many miscarriages as other women, from using the formaldehyde-based products in their profession, such as hair perms, nail products, and disinfectants.

24. How does the new vitamin C cream help to maintain youthful skin?

This is the newest entry after Retin A and alpha hydroxy acids (AHA). It is a nonprescription, reformulated vitamin C serum that can penetrate the skin to help repair collagen, which is the network of fibers supporting the skin. It also protects the skin from brown sunspots.

25. How does sunscreen work?

Some sunscreens are actual blocks to the sunlight. For instance, titanium dioxide will act as a block and will prevent the sun's rays from reaching the skin. Other chemicals act as UV (ultraviolet) absorbers, thus preventing the harmful effects of the sunlight.

26. Is nail polish harmful to the nails?

Our fingernails, like our hair, are composed of dead cells. In most cases applying chemicals to these is not harmful to the body. Sometimes chemicals in nail polish, such as formaldehyde, can affect the surrounding skin. Also chemicals applied to the hair, such as calcium thioglycollate, can affect the skin of the scalp.

27. How do we get sufficient vitamin D without exposing our skin to harmful sun rays?

Dermatologists all agree that we should avoid the sun. However, it is beneficial to expose our face, arms, and hands to sunlight for only 10 to 15 minutes

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two or three times during the week. Vitamin D is stored over the winter in our bodies. Multiple vitamins should contain 10 mcg or 400 IU of vitamin D.

28. What are some of the chemicals recommended by physicians for skin rejuvenation?

The first one that was recognized as being effective was retinoic acid. This was a prescription ointment drug until the over-the-counter product was approved in the mid-nineties, and proved effective. Another is glycolic acid, which is available in makeup products or in more concentrated forms from physicians. There is also Kojic acid, alpha hydroxy acid, beta hydroxy acid, and the newest vitamin C products. Hydroquinone is another chemical that is used because it has a bleaching effect on the skin.

29. As a swimmer, I find that my dyed hair fades a lot. What chemical causes this?

If you swim in the ocean, it is the salt; if you swim in a pool, it could be the chlorine. Also, the cheaper high-alkaline shampoos cause hair drying.

30. What is in those lotions that are supposed to make the skin look suntanned?

The active ingredient is a chemical called dihydroxyacetone. It works by reacting with the protein in the skin, which causes the skin to have a tan or brown appearance.

Cleaning Products

1. Do household cleaning items require labeling to tell us what is in the product?

No, labeling is required only if it is flammable, corrosive, or toxic. It must then be labeled "dangerous" or "poison."

2. Do air fresheners really freshen the air?

No, they cover up the offensive odor with a stronger odor. The sprays are oil based and when inhaled, the oily substance covers the olfactory and smelling surfaces and prevents us from smelling the other odors.

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3. Should we launder new clothes before we wear them?

Some people should. Most clothing and fabrics are coated with a chemical finishing agent that some people find irritating or the cause of allergic reactions. This is particularly true with permanent press.

4. What is the most common problem encountered when using cleaning products?

The most common problem is the result of people using products without adequate ventilation.

5. What is the chemical used by dry cleaners?

The most common one is "perc," or perchloroethylene. It is used in 85% of the 30,000 dry-cleaning shops. They emit 92,000 tons of this into the air each year. It is also used in metal polishes and degreasers.

6. Is this perchloroethylene chemical harmful?

It is a probable carcinogen (causes cancer) on the EPA list. When breathed, it is moderately toxic, causes eye and skin irritation, and possibly hallucinations, coma, and lung changes. People who live near dry cleaners have been exposed to "perc" levels hundreds of times higher than the acceptable guidelines. Newly dry-cleaned clothing should be hung out in the open for airing, and never hung in children's rooms. Children are more sensitive to toxic substance.

7. What is the most dangerous chemical around the house?

The most dangerous one is the one in an unmarked container. Many times people transfer the contents from the original container to another bottle or jar that is not labeled. The tragedy of children consuming or using something like this is well known by the poison control centers.

8. Is it dangerous to mix cleaning products?

Yes, that should be avoided. For instance the common mistake of mixing plain household bleach and ordinary ammonia to clean a sink or bathtub can produce a deadly phosgene gas.

9. What are some other strong cleaning chemicals we should know about?

The caustics such as sodium hydroxide in oven cleaners or drain cleaners are very toxic and corrosive. This kind of product will have definite instructions and warning labels that should be followed carefully.

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10. What are some other names for caustics such as sodium hydroxide?

They are caustic soda, lye, soda lye, sodium hydrate, sodium hydroxide, and white caustic.

11. Isn't there a lot less pollution in the air we breathe since the automobiles have all those catalytic converters and air pollution control devices?

Yes, at least the levels of CO₂, or carbon monoxide have been reduced from motor vehicles. Some scientists say that it would be hard to asphyxiate oneself with a new, well-tuned vehicle.

12. Are some states better than others when it comes to labeling laws?

Yes, both California and New Jersey have stricter laws than the other states.

13. How did the labeling laws make products safe?

Obviously it is better for people to be informed, but also some products were actually reformulated after the labeling laws were passed so consumers would not complain about the harmful ingredients.

14. What is an example of a product that was reformulated after the labeling law was passed?

Trichoroethylene, a cancer-causing chemical, was removed from correction fluid. Percloroethylene was removed from spot remover.

15. Just because a chemical causes cancer in laboratory mice does that mean we should avoid it?

Materials that cause cancer in one type of animal usually cause cancer in other animals according to the Cancer Institute. To prevent cancer we cannot wait for absolute proof of carcinogenicity in humans.

16. What does it mean when it is said "The dose makes the poison"?

This refers to the fact that some chemicals are harmless in the specific amounts necessary for a particular purpose, but they are harmful when used or consumed excessively.

17. Since we are indoors most of the time, are we exposed to more chemicals?

Yes, in fact the EPA thinks that indoor pollution is one of the major health risks of the decade. We have had several episodes of the sick building syndrome already.

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18. How can we avoid the problems of inhaling the outgassing of formaldehyde from wood paneling, fumes coming from freshly dry-cleaned clothing, and the other indoor pollutants?

The old saying is that the "solution to pollution is dilution." This means that it is good to open windows or use ventilation fans.

19. What is the ingredient in toothpaste that causes canker sores in some people?

SLS or sodium lauryl sulfate is an emulsifier. An emulsifier is something added to a formulation to prevent ingredients from separating and decomposing. Sodium lauryl sulfate (SLS) is a common ingredient in toothpaste, shampoos, detergents, and so on. A recent study indicated that it may dry out the mucous membrane of the mouth, causing canker sores in susceptible individuals.

Miscellaneous Questions

1. What is the single most important chemical?

This is really difficult to answer because chemicals do so many different things. In one respect, chlorine is the chemical that has saved more human lives than any other as a result of its water purifying effects.

2. If I have a choice of paper towels, hot air dryers, or pull-down linen towels to dry my hands, which should I use to avoid bacteria?

There have been English studies that showed that most hot air dryers blew out bacteria that could cause bronchial pneumonia. Many of them blew out bacteria that indicated fecal contamination. Linen towels reduced the bacteria on people's hands by more than 40% and paper hand towels by nearly 60%.

3. What is melatonin?

Melatonin is a hormone that is secreted by the pineal gland, a pea-sized organ in the center of the brain. Originally it was used in low doses to hasten sleep and overcome jet lag. More recently, people have begun thinking of it as a fountain of youth.

4. Has the government approved melatonin?

Melatonin is sold as an over-the-counter supplement. As a result it is a dietary

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supplement and not a drug, so it is not subject to testing and approval by the Food and Drug Administration.

5. Is it known whether melatonin is definitely harmful to some people?

There are many who should not take it; these include children, nursing mothers, pregnant women, those with conception problems, mentally unstable people, those taking steroids, cancer patients, people with severe allergies, and those with autoimmune diseases. This is the reason a person must check with a physician before taking supplements.

6. From where is melatonin derived?

It is derived from an amino acid called tryptophan. Melatonin does influence serotonin and dopamine, neurochemicals in the brain.

7. What are amino acids?

These are the building blocks of protein. There are twenty considered necessary for our health, and eight of these must be obtained through the diet.

8. What is astragalus?

This is a plant that grows in the western U.S. It is also called locoweed and milk vetch. Recent research has suggested that it shows promise as an immune booster for cancer patients. It is toxic to sheep, cattle, and horses when ingested.

9. What is echinacea?

This is an extract of the purple coneflower plant. It is a popular item in health food stores for self medicating. European studies indicate that it reduces the severity of cold and flu symptoms and is believed to increase the production of white blood cells. It is used by Native Americans as an antiviral agent. It should not be used for more than seven days as it can suppress the immune function.

10. What is ma huang?

This is a controversial central nervous system stimulant. The source is the dried leaves of a Chinese plant. It is used in sports nutrition and diet products. It contains ephidrene, an alkaloid found in decongestants and asthma medicine. Death has resulted for some people who took it and had heart, thyroid, circulatory problems, or, in some instances, combined it with caffeine. In many states pharmacists only sell it to people 18 or older.

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11. Are the herbal mixtures sold in magazines and at concerts to teenagers as a natural alternative to street drugs dangerous?

They definitely could be. The products usually contain stimulants such as ma huang, ephedra, kola nut, green tea, and guarana. These all contain caffeine. These combinations have caused heart attacks, strokes, and nerve damage as well as death in some individuals.

12. What is chitin?

It is a substance found naturally in the shells of crustaceans, such as crab, shrimp, and lobster. It is also found in the exoskeleton of marine zooplankton, such as coral and jellyfish. Insects also have chitin in their wings. Examples would be butterflies and ladybugs. The cell walls of mushroom and other fungi contain this also. This substance is used in food, cosmetics, and biomedicine. It has been found to be an antibacterial, antifungal, and antiviral and used for wound dressings, sutures, cataract surgery, and periodontal disease treatment. Its many sources and uses make it a fascinating material.

13. What are some of the beneficial insects that replace chemical insecticides in the garden?

Examples of beneficial insects are syrphid flies, lacewings, parasitic wasps, and ladybugs, which eat the mites that attack plants.

14. What is diatomaceous earth and what are its uses?

It's a powdery material formed from the shells of one-celled sea plants such as diatoms. Each particle is sharp and can kill insects by abrasion. This is its mode of operation as a pesticide.

15. What is the name of the metal that can burn?

Magnesium is the metal that can burn and the dust can cause serious explosions, as all dust can. When the fires become large in an industrial situation they cannot be extinguished except by smothering, that is, by excluding oxygen from the site.

16. Why are the chemicals in some antibiotics not as effective against diseases as they once were?

Some people take antibiotics for viral sicknesses, such as head colds, without determining that the cause is bacterial. Antibiotics will not cure viral sicknesses and our body becomes resistant to their effectiveness when we really need them. Some people stop taking medication too soon and the antibiotics do not completely kill off all the bacteria and mutate into a new strain. Antibi-

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otics should only be prescribed for bacterial infections and the patient should take all of the medication.

17. Some athletes are taking a chemical called vanadyl sulfate to produce the bulked up look attained via steroids. Is this safe?

Vanadyl sulfate is a cloth or ceramic dye that is not meant for human consumption. There is a product being sold to athletes, who believe it is a wonder drug. The fact is that this chemical can cause the pancreas to reduce the production of insulin and develop a type II diabetic state. Until further studies of this product are released, it would be advisable to avoid it.

18. What are the disease-fighting chemical nutrients referred to as flavonoids and retinoids?

If you eat green salads, you will be consuming these disease-fighting nutrients. They are also found in blueberries and grapes in high concentrations. Flavonoids are compounds found in plants. They have antioxidant and antiinflammatory effects.

19. We bought some bags that are supposed to keep our fruits and vegetables from rotting as fast. From what chemical is this bag made and how does it work?

These green plastic-like bags are made from oya, a natural mineral that absorbs ethylene gas. The gas causes the rotting.

20. What is the chemical in those little birthday cake candles that reignite after you blow them out?

They have magnesium crystals in them, which retain the heat even after the flame is out. The heat is great enough to reignite them. Obviously this is a dangerous fire hazard if handled improperly.

21. What is the chemical used as a deterrent for the problem of excessive wild Canadian geese in some areas?

Methyl anthranilate, a chemical that occurs naturally in orange blossoms, jasmine flowers, and grapes. This substance is used in making saccharin and chewing gum flavoring. However, geese are repelled by grass sprayed with this substance and move on to other ponds and grassy areas. This prevents excessive bird droppings in suburban parks. It is otherwise harmless to the birds.

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22. What chemicals can be added to cut flowers to keep them fresher longer?

Take a pint of warm water and one pint of lemonade or lemon-lime soft drink, mix them together, and be sure the bottom three or four inches of the stems are covered. This works because the sugar in the mixture supplies nutrients to the flowers, and the citric acid acts as a preservative.

23. If we consume toxic chemicals we can get sick or even die. Are there some plants that would harm my pets in the same way?

Yes, we have a list of common plants that are toxic to pets. This list does not include all the harmful plants, just the most common ones. They are amaryllis, arrowhead vine, asparagus fern, azalea, bird of paradise, Boston ivy, chrysanthemum, creeping Charlie, creeping figs or ficus, crown of thorns, dieffenbachia or dumb cane, elephant ears, emerald duke, ivies, Jerusalem cherry, pothos, philodendrons, pot mums, red princess, spider mum, sperengeri fern, umbrella plant, weeping fig, mistletoe berries, poinsettia; also most plant bulbs.

24. What is the chemical used in the manufacture of toys to make them antibacterial?

That is Microban®, which permanently bonds tiny germ-killing pellets to plastic or fiber. It is used in highchair trays and plastic toys. Actually, hospitals have been using products with Microban® such as surgical drapes, mattresses, and pillowcases, for over ten years. The newest products include foodcutting boards, athletic shoes, and carpeting that will have Microban® fighting microbes. Microban® stops mold, mildew, fungi, and bacteria, including E coli, staph, salmonella, and strep.

25. What is meant by homocysteine levels?

This is an amino acid that is a result of high protein diets. It is thought to be as harmful as high cholesterol. A level above 14 is considered dangerous. This can be reduced by consuming folic acid supplements.

26. What is the best way to break down the harmful amino acid homocysteine in the blood?

The latest heart healthy information advises us to eat a variety of foods rich in vitamin B6 and folic acid. These vitamins help to break down homocysteine.

27. What is coenzyme Q10?

It is an enzyme substance, similar to a vitamin, that aids organ and muscle cells and is purported to improve energy and slow the aging process. Research

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is being done to determine if it aids heart, lung, or Huntington disease patients.

28. What is the meaning of the term "umami"?

Science tells us that we can determine four tastes: salty, sweet, sour, and bitter. Umami is the fifth taste. It senses the presence of glutamate. This makes food taste richer, more savory, well-rounded, and more full-bodied.

29. Is any DDT used in the United States?

The DDT found in the U.S. comes in on fruits and vegetables from Mexico. Sometimes it drifts across the border from Mexican crop spraying or is in the water supply in the border states. Mexico continued to use this chemical to kill mosquitoes that cause malaria. They have now agreed to phase out its use over the next ten years.

30. What is pycnogenol that is so popular in health food stores?

It is the antioxidant isolated from the bark of a pine tree by Masquelier, a French chemist. This was about 50 years ago. The active principal is OPC, which is found in grape seeds.

31. What is the good ingredient in green tea?

Green tea leaves contain an easily absorbable natural antioxidant called polyphenols or catechins. Recent research indicates that it may be a protective factor against some fatal diseases, including cancer.

32. What are glucosamine sulfate and chondroitin sulfate?

These are synthetic versions of compounds the body makes to stimulate the growth of cartilage. The theory is that these compounds rebuild cartilage and reduce the symptoms of arthritis. It is an acceptable treatment in veterinary medicine, but the Arthritis Foundation and the American College of Rheumatology have not recommended it for humans. The Food and Drug Administration has not approved it to treat arthritis. At this time, they are sold as nutritional supplements, and therefore do not need evidence that they are safe and effective.

Antibiotic

These are nisin, pimaricin, nystatin, tylosin.

Precautions: A possible allergen. Overuse of antibiotics can lead to the development of resistant strains of antibiotics. Some antibiotics enter humans via the food chain. Antibiotics from cattle that have been treated with antibiotic medication and slaughtered too early can reach the consumer. The same can happen with milk cows that have had udder infections.

Antimony Trisulfide

Products and Uses: In matches and camouflage paints. As a coloring agent in fireworks.

Precautions: Could possibly be corrosive or toxic, depending on application.

Products and Uses: Frequently found in low nutritional, high sugar content foods, candy, carbonated drinks, ice sticks, gelatins, and breakfast cereals. Flavorings are added when real fruit, or natural flavor, are absent. Recently, some research states that there may be benefits in consuming artificial flavorings. Flavorings contain salicylates, a chemical cousin of aspirin, and aspirin lowers the risk of heart attack by preventing blood clots. Most people are said to consume the equivalent of one baby aspirin a day from artificial flavorings.

Precautions: Flavorings that occur in nature are usually safe. Artificial flavorings are usually less desirable.

Products and Uses: Spray for winter and Christmas displays and decorations.

Products and Uses: Mineral fiber used in fireproof materials, brake linings, gaskets, roofing compositions, paint filler, and filters.

Aspartame

As a flavor enhancer, sugar substitute (approximately 71% of market).

Precautions: FDA approves use at moderate levels. Made from two amino acids. It is equal to sucrose in calories, but it is 200 times sweeter. Therefore, the amount needed to sweeten food is negligible. Could cause allergic dermatitis. Caused reproductive effects (infertility or sterility or birth defects) in animal studies. Aspartame contains a chemical called phenylanine that is dangerous to people with the disease phenylketonuria (PKU).

Precautions: FDA states GRAS (generally recognized as safe) when used for intended purpose. Limited to 5% in salad dressing.

Baking Soda

This occurs because baking soda releases carbon dioxide and the stomach is too full, or there is damage as a result of ulcers or obstruction. It has high so-

Batteries

Products and Uses: There are five main types: lead storage batteries for autos, motorcycles, lawnmowers, and so on; zinc chloride or zinc carbon batteries for calculators and clocks; alkaline batteries used in cameras and radios; nicklecadmium rechargable batteries that can be used repeatedly; and button cell batteries used in watches and hearing aids. Batteries are not energy efficient. Their manufacture requires 50 times more energy than they will produce.

Caused reproductive effects in animal studies (infertility or sterility or birth defects). A human mutagen (changes inherited characteristics). A skin irritant. EPA was ordered by courts to revoke approval as food additive in 1992.

Products containing 5% or more by weight must be labeled "Danger: Vapor Harmful, Poison" with the skull and crossbones symbol. BHA and **BHT**

Products and Uses: Both are antioxidants commonly added in small amounts to food, particularly to oils and fats, as preservatives. Also used as preservative in rubber and plastics. Recent claims have been made that they inhibit cancers in lab animals, prevent herpes and other viruses, and increase life spans. There has been no scientific research to prove these theories.

Precautions: There has been some evidence that BHT could promote the growth of some cancers. There have also been allergic reactions reported by some.

It is also implicated in cardiac disorders and fibrocystic breast problems. One cup of drip-brewed coffee has 115 mg. One cup of tea has 40 mg. A 12-oz cola drink has 46 mg. More than 300 mg a day can overstimulate the central nervous system.

Chaparral

Products and Uses: A porous form of carbon, used as a decolorizing agent, odor-removing agent, purification agent in fat and beverage processing, and as a taste-removing agent. Animal charcoal, produced by heating bones and dissolving out the calcium phosphates and mineral salts with acid, is used in sugar refining.
